

Shibori Textile Museum

Shibori is a Japanese **traditional dyeing textile** and it used to be a part of Japasnese life though it cannot be more popular than industrialized textiles nowadays. The beauty of Shibori is the **natural deep blue** color which can recall us the sound of water and the smell of wild plants. Obviously the true beauty of Shibori can only be found with natural light and wind and you could feel as if you are looking at nature itself. It dances with the wind and talks with the sun.



The other important point of Shibori can be found from the origin of the word. "Shiboru" in Japanese means "to wring, squeeze, press." Although shibori used to be designated as a particular group of resist-dyed textiles, the verb root of the word emphasizes the action performed on cloth, the process of manipulating fabric. Rather than treating cloth as a two-dimensional surface, with shibori it is given a three-dimensional form by folding, crumpling, stitching, plaiting, or plucking and twisting.

The museum was designed to give **rebirth** of Shibori with water, light and wind. Visitors can flow in the museum as if they become a sheet of waving shibori and the streams of people affect each other and create a smooth turn **as if a sheet of shibori dance with light and wind or as if a textile is being twisted and created to become a sheet of shibori**






The site

This museum is situated at the edge of the river and on the river. The outline of the building is based on the natural shape of the river's edge and the main access shaped like a stream or a waving cloth.































Gallery 2, 3 & 4

Gallery 2 is literally situated above the river and it is completely filled with sunlight. The roof of gallery 4 is slightly tilted and it works for getting sunlight and indirect light.
